



OLIVIA COSIO, 18 SAN FRANCISCO, CALIFORNIA

Olivia Cosio grew up in a low-income and notoriously dangerous section of San Francisco known as the Tenderloin. Her home is on the cusp of two very influential neighborhoods – one infiltrated with crime, drugs, and violence, and the other filled with the creation and expression of art – the

home of the San Francisco Opera, Symphony, and Ballet. Growing up, she had to make a choice between these two neighborhoods. She chose art.

Olivia attended public schools with strong performing arts departments and originally wanted to be a dancer, but at age 11, she experienced a powerful moment with her grandfather that opened her eyes to the power of music and its ability to communicate what words cannot.

In the final days of his life, overtaken by Alzheimer's disease, Olivia's grandfather was lying in the hospital, his eyes closed and his body unresponsive. Despite the fact that he did not know who she was, Olivia sat by him, held his hand and began to sing "You Are My Sunshine," a song they had often sung together. Though seemingly unaware of everything around him, as she began to sing, he grabbed her hand.

Now 18 years old, Olivia remembers, "This showed me how singing and music can transcend and reach people when nothing else can."

Through her hard work and tenacity, Olivia has already begun garnering praise and success for her vocal talent. Shortly after performing on *From the Top*, she was selected as a 2014 YoungArts Finalist and participated in National YoungArts Week in Miami, Florida. Olivia was also chosen as the winner of the 2014 Avanti Award – the San Francisco Bay Area's preeminent award for performance and visual excellence for artists of all ages.

At her recent graduation from the Ruth Asawa San Francisco School of the Arts, Olivia was recognized for her achievements in art, academics, and in her tutoring work with San Francisco's Breakthrough Collaborative. She was awarded the Sunny Brown Foundation Scholarship in honor of outstanding scholastic, artistic, and personal achievement.

Yet, even with her successes, the ability to continue her music studies still comes with challenges.

An only child, Olivia has a very close and special relationship with her parents. Her mother, despite being Olivia's greatest fan, is unable to support her as much as she would like due to debilitating illness. Olivia has great love, admiration, and respect for her mother. She helps as much as she is able with many small tasks, but also feels a sense of guilt for pursuing singing because it is so financially demanding, and her family already has great financial strain.

Receiving the Jack Kent Cooke Young Artist Award provided not only financial support, allowing Olivia to pay for private lessons and cover all her college audition travel costs, but also encouragement that a career in singing was possible.

"Receiving the Jack Kent Cooke Young Artist Award meant that I could focus on my singing throughout my senior year without the limitations and burdens of my family's financial hardship," she explains. "Furthermore, receiving the Award meant that someone believed in my talent and was willing to help me reach my goals. This meant the world to me and inspired me to work harder, sing more, and dream farther."

Olivia will be travelling to Oberlin, Ohio, soon to begin her freshman year at the Oberlin Conservatory of Music – her first-choice school.

When asked where she will be in five years, Olivia says, "I see myself singing, but I could also see myself teaching music. And even if I can't sing professionally, I will always continue to sing – even if no one is listening."

DAVID VON BEHREN, 18 ORGAN FALLS CITY, NEBRASKA

"Classical music has the power to uplift, inspire, and engage. My dream is to change the lives of others for the better through my music."

When 18-year-old David von Behren took his place behind the giant organ in El Paso's historic Plaza Theatre and rested his fingers on the keys, he brought his own brand of positive energy to From the Top. The first classical organist to receive From the Top's Jack Kent Cooke Young Artist Award, David is a teenage dichotomy. A member of the marching band (he also plays trumpet and is an accomplished violinist), he was voted Homecoming King at his Falls City, Nebraska high school, prompting From the Top to select him as their "Stereotype Smasher of the Year."

Not long after his appearance on the show, David departed for college at the Cleveland Institute of Music, but not before using From the Top's arts leadership training to bring a childhood dream to fruition. Each recipient of the Jack Kent Cooke Young Artist Award is responsible for executing an Arts Leadership Project; David jumped at that opportunity to launch The Little Stars Summer Music Program.

"The idea began when I was a child." David explains. "My mom is a preschool teacher, and as a student in her class, I remember all of the group activities at that age: "tee" ball, swimming lessons, and story time at the public library. I enjoyed private music lessons, but I wished there was a way for me to learn about music with other kids my age."

The summer of 2013 was the inaugural year of the Little Stars Summer Music Program, the brainchild of David and his mother, Glenda. 20 children, ages 3 to 6, began each day listening to recordings of composers such as Rachmaninoff, Tchaikovsky, Saint-Saëns, Mozart, Beethoven, and more, all carefully selected by David to guide the students in their daily activities.

Over three weeks, the students learned about dynamics, rhythm, and solfège, and each student received initial training on the piano, violin, and cello, with small group and private lessons from David and Glenda. But one of the highlights for David was teaching the kids conducting, first with a pencil and then with their own baton.



"It was very inspirational for me to see the students get so excited about conducting," David told us. "Sometimes I think that teachers assume that concepts are too beyond youngsters and don't give them a chance to try something challenging."

Perhaps one of the most unique aspects of Little Stars is that it gets the parents involved. David created lesson plans for each class that gave the parents an overview of the concepts and exercises covered, and provided a "Parent Listening Guide", which included references to thought-provoking music videos to watch with their kids over the weekend.

This summer, David and his mom are proudly continuing the Little Stars Summer Music Program for the second year in a row, adding more sessions for pre-school aged students, and including a separate program for children aged 7 to 11.

"The biggest thing I have taken away from this project is to never underestimate the creativity in children and music! The students absorb music like sponges," David said. "My Jack Kent Cooke Young Artist Award Project has helped me to achieve my goal to get both parents and children excited about classical music!"

QING YU CHEN, 13 QUEENS, NEW YORK

"The Jack Kent Cooke Young Artist Award was a highlight in my year, my life, and a milestone in my progress."

The leaves were changing on the trees when Qing Yu traveled to Charlotte, North Carolina, from her home in New York for a live *From the Top* recording at Wingate University. The vivacious 13-year-old quickly stole the hearts of the From the Top crew, but when she rested her chin on her violin and drew the bow for the first time, she took everyone's breath away.

Qing Yu received From the Top's Jack Kent Cooke Young Artist Award in conjunction with her appearance on our NPR show, which she said, "felt like a dream come true." An exceptionally talented violinist at such a young age, Qing Yu's performance was "sassy" according to our host, Christopher O'Riley. She giggled, smiled, and chatted comfortably with Christopher about her mischievous antics with her sister and her compassion for fellow students who struggle with the English language.

Thanks to the Jack Kent Cooke Foundation, Qing Yu Chen was able to purchase a new bow to replace the one she was using on loan. She was also able to attend the Aspen Summer Music



Festival and School, allowing her to continue studying with her teacher during the summer. Qing Yu said that receiving the Award was "the beginning of a new chapter... an exciting story that is yet to be told through music."

Not long after appearing on *From the Top*, Qing Yu was also selected by the Jack Kent Cooke Foundation for their Young Scholars' Program, a program that offers a personalized and very generous scholarship as well as educational support to exceptionally promising students from across the nation who have financial need. As part of this program, Qing Yu will receive comprehensive advising and financial support for her musical and academic studies from eighth grade throughout high school.

An outgoing and sweet girl, Qing Yu's inquisitive and impish personality bubbles over in conversation, but in her thank you letter to the Jack Kent Cooke Foundation, she found herself at a loss for words.

"When words fail to communicate, there is always music." She explains, "No way in my lifetime will I ever be able to fully express my gratitude and thanks without taking breaks of practice sessions in between."


